Today is Friday, March 20, 2020. I am sitting in my office here at City Hall, listening to the traffic going up and down Main Street. Today is my deadline to turn in the Mayor's Message for the Ninety North Main newsletter to be distributed by April 1st. With the constant changes happening in the world on a daily basis, it is difficult to know what will be current and correct by the time you read this.

These are some things I do know that are real. The employees who work for Tooele City are the best! I watched how they stepped up the morning of March 18th to do not only their own job but to help others where needed. When the earth quit shaking, we had boots on the ground checking our water and sewer systems (which by the way are working perfectly with no damage reported). Without any interruption we had clean water and a place for our dirty water to go. Volunteer firefighters were on stand-by to report where needed and respond to any emergency. Police Officers were on the job and responding to all calls. By noon, our entire Police Department personnel along with many others were moving equipment, records, and all necessary items from the old police building to the new one. While no other building in Tooele City suffered much structural damage, our old police building did. Ironically, we had just received a temporary occupancy permit for the new building just 18 hours before the quake hit.

City building inspectors were out immediately to assess damage to businesses to ensure the safety of their employees and customers. Several staff members were by the phone all day long to respond to residents calling in with questions of concern. Public works crews were inspecting potential damage to streets and utility lines. Staff members were in constant contact with Tooele County Emergency Management and keeping the lines of communication open with all local jurisdictions. Grantsville City Mayor Marshall and County Commissioner Tripp both called me within minutes to offer help and assistance. In my opinion, this potential catastrophe was handled professionally, efficiently and at the highest level of cooperation. The earthquake hit at a time when we were already in the midst of the world's response to this health pandemic. We had just closed the Library and the Pratt Aquatic Center to comply with state health requests to keep our residents safe. Although the doors are locked, our library staff is still working and serving you. Please follow them on Facebook and Instagram.

As a result of the earthquake on March 18th there were concerns over the structural integrity of our old police station and we were able to move to our new police station, located at 50 North Garden Street, earlier than expected. Due to good social distancing practices and limiting public gatherings, we will not be having our ribbon cutting for the new police station on April 6th as was previously announced, but we will hold a public open house when we are able to do so.

The 2020 Census is easier to take than ever before. For the first time, it can be done in minutes online including on your phone. The census can also be completed easily by phone or mail. However you decide to complete it, be sure to be counted. You matter. Your information is required by law and your information is protected.

- 3. Send questionnaire by mail

The census plays a part in every day for Utahns from education and roads to healthcare and politics. The outcome of the census can determine electoral representation down to the local level, including school boards and city councils. Infrastructure decisions and funding, from road repairs to transit development, use information based on census counts. Public safety uses these numbers to guide decisions about service areas, fire stations, police precincts and hospitals. Among everything else that we are experiencing in the world around us, Tooele City's Reclamation Plant (sewer plant) is seeing an influx of baby wipes entering our sewer system.

Have you ever wondered who is responsible when your sewer lateral or water service line needs repair? City Code 8-6-13

states "All building sewers, including the connection to the POTW sewer, shall maintained be bv the property owner". Property owners are responsible for their own sewer laterals up to the wye connection to the main sewer line. City Code 9-4-6 states "Tooele City shall maintain the service pipe from the main line to and including the water meter and other apparatus within the meter box." Property owners are responsible for their own water lines from the meter box connection into the property and structure. Did you know that Utah law requires the City to educate the citizens on this? Trees are the ANSWER, but can also be the PROBLEM. Trees can hurt individuals, and can also contribute to vehicle damage. It is important to trim trees that

hang out into the street. A height of 16 feet is required for vehicles to pass under. On a sidewalk, a height of 8 feet is necessary for individuals to walk underneath.
