THE COUNCIL'S CORNER

The municipal general vote canvass was approved by the City Council, as required by state code. Once again, the results prove the value of every vote in an election. Congratulations to those elected and to all the candidates who ran for office. The candidates were respectful in their campaigns and discussed many ideas to improve Tooele City. I appreciate that we live in a country where we have the freedom to elect representatives and continue to reach out to those representatives with concerns or questions.

In the November 17, 2021 Council meeting, the Council approved Ordinance 2021-38, an ordinance explaining the importance of trees and setting expectations for Tooele City to become a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA is a program started by the Arbor Day Foundation. The ordinance establishes a tree department/tree advisory board, commits funding to planting and maintaining trees (\$2 per capita in cash or in kind), and specifies standards to properly maintain trees. The City Council and Administration have discussed this topic several times over the past two years and even committed funding in the budget to eventually become a Tree City USA community. The idea lost momentum in 2020 after the pandemic started, but in the spring of 2021, Tooele City had an Arbor Day celebration and planted several trees at the Aquatic Center Park and Oquirrh Hills Golf Course and the goal to become a Tree City USA once again gained momentum. During our discussions, we received an email from a resident expressing concerns about the number of dead trees at the Skyline Nature Park. The timing was perfect and I met with the Administration the following week to discuss a tree ordinance. The ordinance was then brought before the Council in a work session for discussion and brought back again two weeks later for a vote. It has been a long process to implement this ordinance in Tooele City, but I am confident that our children and grandchildren will be sitting under a shade tree because of the decisions made today. This is a monumental step to improve our parks and open space for future generations.

Please continue to send your emails, concerns, or questions to the City Council and Administration. We are here to serve and create a community that we can be proud of now and in the future.

Congratulations to Tooele City Recorder Michelle Pitt who has completed the requirements for and received the Certified Municipal Clerks Designation by the Utah Municipal Clerk's Association on September 15, 2021. This certification takes years of hard work and is obtained by actively working in a municipality performing the duties of a Recorder or Clerk and requires the completion of 120 hours of university level course work. The mission of the Municipal Clerk's Association is to provide educational and networking support to promote positive, professional interaction with elected officials, staff, and the general public.

Also on September 15th during the City Council meeting, Holly Potter was sworn in as our new Deputy Recorder. Welcome to the team Holly!

We also welcome our two newest Department Heads to Tooele City — Jamie Grandpre was appointed as the Public Works Director on July 21, 2021 and Christopher Nielson was appointed as our new IT Director on October 20, 2021 and began employment on November 15, 2021.



The Tooele Downtown Alliance was launched as a committee of Tooele City in October of this year. Its mission is to improve and promote the Downtown, Main Street, and Broadway areas of Tooele City. Together this committee can support local business, seek State and Federal grant funding, and promote a downtown that Tooele City residents are proud of.

The Tooele City Downtown Mural was painted by local artist Marcus Medina and features Engine #11 and the mining history of Tooele. The mural is located on the west side of Another Man's Treasures at 14 West Vine Street. The mural project was funded by Tooele City Parks Arts and Recreation (PAR), Tooele City, and the Tooele City Arts Council.

The mural is one successful project to already come from the Tooele City Downtown Alliance. Future projects will include façade grants, historic preservation of important buildings, markets/events, and promotion of "buy local" campaigns.

ALL ABOUT OUR PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Did you know that the Tooele City Parks and Recreation Department works year-round to make Tooele City a beautiful place to live, work, and play? Even though the temperatures have dropped and they are not currently mowing and watering lawns, there is still so much to do! During the fall and winter months the Parks and Recreation Department winterizes sprinkler lines, winterizes park bathrooms, closes down facilities like the pickleball courts, fertilizes grass and trees, prepares snow removal equipment, removes snow from City facilities and sidewalks, maintains equipment, puts up the holiday decorations, and many other jobs!

This fall they have been working to plant over 200 trees that were donated by Thrive Nursery! Thank you Thrive Nursery! Tooele City received a variety of evergreens and deciduous trees that included maples, lindens, oaks, and elms. This fall the City has planted over 100 trees at the Wigwam Park, Cemetery, England Acres, Skyline Park, and at the Oquirrh Hills Golf Course. The remaining trees will be planted at Elton Park, the Aquatic Center Park, and the Red Del Papa Park.

The Tooele City Parks and Recreation Department encompasses a myriad of facilities and services. These include numerous City parks and sports fields, the Pratt Aquatic Center, the Oquirrh Hills Golf Course, the Tooele Valley Museum, and the Tooele City Cemetery. The Tooele City Parks and Recreation Department is also responsible for the maintenance of 12 major buildings structures that include City Hall, the Library, the Dow James Building, and the Police Station. They also offer youth programs and family activities year round!



Snow Event Parking Restrictions and Winter Weather Reminders



Snow Event Parking Restrictions

Tooele City Code 10-3-6(1) states: It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on any public right-of-way:

- (a) when snow is falling upon that vehicle; or,
- (b) when snow or ice have accumulated in any amount on the right-of-way upon which that vehicle is parked.

(2). Any vehicle parked in violation of this Section may be removed at the discretion of the Tooele City Police Department for creating public safety risks and for obstructing the City's snow removal efforts.

- (3). The following are exempt from this Section:
- (a) emergency vehicles and personnel in the performance of their functions and duties; and,
 - (b) Tooele City public works vehicles and employees in the performance of their functions and duties.

Do not park your vehicles on the street when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated.

The penalty for parking violations is \$50 if paid within 15 days, and \$100 thereafter.

As the winter months approach we want to remind you that Tooele City Code 4-11-15(1) requires that residential and business sidewalks must be cleared of snow, hail, ice, and sleet within 24 hours after a storm stops, this is especially important in areas that are school walking routes!

Keep you driveways and walks clear so that firefighters, medics, and postal workers can reach your house or business.

When major storms occur, the fire hydrants nearest to your home should be kept clear so that firefighters can readily locate and use them.

Do not place or propel snow, hail, ice and sleet in roadway or other portions of sidewalks. Tooele City Code 4-11-15(2) states: *"It is unlawful for any person to place or propel, or cause to be placed or propelled, snow, ice, hail, or sleet in the public way or in any manner which poses a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic."* Please be courteous to your neighbors — do not blow leaves, snow or other debris into their yards.

Please do not park your vehicles on the street (or on the park strip or the sidewalk—they are also the right-of-way) when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated. Streets need to be clear of vehicles, basketball hoops, and other obstructions for plows to safely and efficiently clear the streets. Trees should be trimmed to at least a 12'6" minimum so they do not obstruct or damage plows. Also, as a reminder, if your basketball hoop is on the park strip, please make sure the hoop itself doesn't hang over the street where it can get snagged on the snow plows.

The State Library examined and scored eight areas of service in which the library made additional efforts to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. Emergency Vehicles

When dealing with emergency situations we commonly see drivers panic and over-react or react incorrectly when they see an emergency vehicle with lights and sirens approaching.

Here are some rules to remember:

1. You must yield the right of way.
2. Drive to the far right edge of the curb.
3. Clear the intersection.
4. You must STOP!

When you see an emergency vehicle approaching with lights and sirens, (if possible) pull your vehicle to the far right side of the roadway. If you can't pull right then leave room for the emergency vehicle to get by. If you are already stopped, stay put! Once the emergency vehicle has passed, be sure to re-enter the travel lane with caution. Always keep the intersection clear because you don't know which way the emergency vehicle will have to go. As curious as you may be, do not follow an emergency vehicle leaving a scene. If you come to an intersection blocked by emergency vehicles, slow down! Watch for directions given by police personnel on the scene and proceed as directed.

When approaching a stationary emergency vehicle, drivers need to reduce their speed, provide as much space as possible, and make a lane change into a lane not adjacent to the authorized emergency vehicle. This is generally a bigger issue for emergency personnel than failing to yield the right of way. Emergency personnel are hit by vehicles almost every year in Utah. We would like to remind the public to slow down and change lanes to provide a safer work environment for our emergency personnel.

HOLIDAY RECYCLING TIPS

(1) Plain wrapping paper is recyclable but if the wrapping paper has glitter, foil, or other embellishments it is not recyclable. (2) Bows and ribbons, plastic or cloth, are not recyclable! Reuse bows and ribbons if you can. (3) Like wrapping paper, plain paper gift bags are recyclable if the handles are removed; however during the holidays we see more bags made of other types of materials that aren't recyclable. Reuse bags instead! (4) String lights are recyclable, but not in your recycling bin! They can be taken to a local metal recycler for recycling! (5) Recycle all cardboard boxes but toss any bubble wrap/styrofoam/pillows in the trash!

BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWALS for 2022 should be arriving just after December 1, 2021. Commercial businesses, you can mail in your payment, bring your payment in person to the Finance Department at City Hall or leave your payment in the Utility Payment Drop Box on the south side of City Hall, or **NEW THIS YEAR** — businesses can renew their license and make payment online at <https://www.municipalonlinepayments.com/tooeleut>. Please include the business license number that is on your business license certificate in the upper left-hand corner under the Tooele City logo. You have through the month of January to renew your license. On February 1, 2022 a 50% late fee will be assessed. If you are no longer in business, please let us know in writing by e-mailing lisac@tooelecit.org. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the Business Licensing Office at (435) 843-2110. Thank you!

BUSINESS LICENSES REQUIRED in Tooele City: Anyone offering a "Service" from their home, for compensation, requires a Tooele City Business License.
