MAYOR'S MESSAGE

MAYOR DEBBIE WINN

We made it through the long hot summer and survived the drought conditions! I am grateful to all of our residents who made it a priority to follow the rules and do all they could to conserve water. We are now relying on the moisture that we may receive this winter to get us through next summer.

OCTOBER 2021

I have great news to share! We have finally broken ground on Phase 2 of England Acres Park. Funding in the amount of \$1.2million was approved by the city council for the FY2020 budget. We began the engineering drawing work on March 9, 2020 which included a parking lot, a pavilion/concession/restroom building, detention/dog park area and additional playground equipment. The plans were not finalized until June 30, 2021. Over a year to complete the engineering plans were all due to COVID! Our engineering firm was shut down on three occasions and were overwhelmed with other work. All construction related businesses were overwhelmed the past year; building has not slowed down, but increased. Between the months of July and September of this year, all projects went out for bid and have been awarded. Broken Arrow has begun to mobilize to construct the parking area (which needs to be completed first) and then other contractors will move in to complete the pavilion and the playground area. We have also awarded work to have the trail system designed through and east of the park up to Smelter Road. This trail will be for walking and biking. We also plan to install lighting along the trail to make it safe for all residents. Many thanks to Rocky Mountain Power for their donation to install benches and other items at the dog park and the trail. I am appreciative of the discussions by the Friends of England Acres Park committee who have waited patiently for work to begin. Now the work begins to design Phase 3 of the park. If you have ideas or want to participate, please contact our Parks and Recreation Department. We are also in the process of completing 7th Street just east of the park, which will connect all the way through to 1000 North. Approvals for this road construction were also held up for many months in anticipation of approval from FEMA to allow us to cross over the Middle Canyon Drainage Ditch.

Many great things are happening in our city! We hope to see you at one of our #TakePrideTooele cleanup events being held in October. Come join your neighbors and elected officials as we clean up neighborhoods together!

THE COUNCIL'S CORNER

September 11, 2001 is a day that should never be forgotten. The victims and families of this terrible act of terrorism deserve the honor and respect that has been given them. I was appreciative of the Tooele City flag raising and the recognition given to our firemen and police force. I would like to thank our military men and women and first responders. These people put their lives on the line every day to keep us safe. 9/11 reminded us that a sense of safety is important and should not be taken for granted. That day also reminded us that unity and a sense of community is important.

The Tooele City Volunteer Fire Department is top notch. They have excellent response times! They respond to hundreds of calls day and night, and they sacrifice time with their family to respond to these calls. As volunteers, our firefighters also save our Tooele City taxpayers millions of dollars. I recently toured both fire stations in Tooele. I was impressed with the dedication and skill these public servants provide to Tooele.

The Tooele City Police Department is comprised of men and women who are also dedicated public servants. It is important for the police force to build relationships within the community and ours does just that. I see our police men and women out in the community and in our schools. I appreciate the respect they show our citizens. Recently, police wages have become an important topic. The agencies along the Wasatch Front have raised salaries to the point that Tooele City police salaries are no longer competitive. It is important that our officers be fairly compensated so they can live within our community and so they want to remain working here. Recently, the City Council had a work session to compare police salaries between many different municipalities – ours were much lower. The council voted to do a mid-year budget adjustment to increase the entry position police officer salary from roughly \$20/hour to \$25.07. This will require the use of reserve funds to pay for the increase this year. I believe increasing the officer wage is important to our public safety.

Service is a great way to build community. I was impressed with the acts of service provided in the City leading up to and on 9/11. I know there were so many that we didn't even see. Whether it is tying ribbons around the trees in the park to recognize our fallen military, having a flag ceremony, using the City's Neighborhood Trailer to clean up a neighborhood, taking cookies to a friend, volunteering at the resource center, or even just smiling at someone on the street — service builds a community. A strong community begins in a neighborhood — get to know your neighbors and participate in community events. "Recognize that every interaction you have is an opportunity to make positive impact on others" (Shep Hyken). Tooele City is a great place to live, together we can make it even better!

TRASH/DEBRIS:

Tooele City

Per Tooele City Code Section 8-4-4 1(b) and (e) of Tooele City Code states these will be deemed a nuisance if: (b) the accumulation of garbage, refuse, or unsightly or deleterious objects or structures upon real property, unless contained in connection with an association lawfully situated and licensed for the same; (e) any other unsightly or deleterious condition that gives rise to a threat to human health or safety. Any garbage/debris/unsightly objects must be properly disposed of within a timely manner!

Tooele City provides a **YEAR ROUND BULK WASTE PICKUP PROGRAM** to help you dispose of items which do not normally fit into your trash container. The pick up day is once a month and there is no additional cost to use this program. You can find the pick up schedule and more information on our website **tooelecity.org.** Here are a few basic checklist items:

- You do not have to schedule a Bulk Waste Pick Up, just put your items on your curb the day before your pick up date. Please do not put items on the curb more than 24 hours in advance.
- Bulk Waste MUST be bagged, boxed, or bundled (with rope or twine).
- □ Tree branches must be cut to less than 5 feet in length and can be no larger than 4 inches in diameter.
- □ Bulk Waste cannot exceed 75 lbs.
- Ensure that you do not have unacceptable Bulk Waste materials such as tires, rocks, dirt, sod, oils, paints, construction debris, or hazardous materials.
- □ Call ACE Disposal at 435-882-7009 if you have questions.

INOPERABLE/ABANDONED VEHICLES:

Tooele City Code Section 8-4-4 1(c) and (d) states that junked, wrecked, or inoperable vehicles may not be kept upon real property for longer than 72 hours. Only two inoperable motor vehicles may be kept upon real property if they are placed behind a screened fence, or in an enclosed building. Vehicle coverings are not considered in compliance with this code.


Tree Maintenance

While trees and vegetation contribute to the beauty of our neighborhoods and community, they may also create unintended obstacles and hazards when not maintained properly. Trees that hang over the street or over the sidewalk can create nuisances and in some cases hazards. Please maintain the trees on your property, particularly the trees in the park strips, to make sure your trees are not creating some of these issues:

- Damage to vehicles, particularly large vehicles such as snowplows and garbage trucks;
- Injury to persons;
- Blocked mailboxes;
- Blocked sidewalks;
- Blocked streetlights, markers and signs.

In August, the Tooele City Council approved Ordinance 2021-09, which amended the civil penalty for parking violations during a snow event. The civil penalty is now the same as for all other parking violations: \$50 if paid within 15 days, and \$100 thereafter.

As a reminder, Tooele City Code 10-3-6. Snow Event Parking Restrictions reads:

1) It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on any public right-of-way:



(h)

(a) when snow is falling upon that vehicle; or,

when snow or ice have accumulated in any amount on the right-of-way upon which that vehicle is parked.

Have you ever wondered who is responsible when your sewer lateral or water service line needs repair? City Code 8-6-13 states "All building sewers, including the connection to the POTW sewer, shall be maintained by the property owner". Property owners are responsible for their own sewer laterals up to the

wye connection to the main sewer line. City Code 9-4-6 states "Tooele City shall maintain the service pipe from the main line to and including the water meter and other apparatus within the meter box." Property owners are responsible for their own water lines from the meter box connection into the property and structure. Did you know that Utah law requires the City to educate the citizens on this? - Residents of Tooele City for at least 30 days prior to election day, and
- At least 18 years old on the day of the election

- By Mail:
 - Ballots will be mailed to active, registered voters the week of October 11, 2021. Postage-paid return envelopes will be provided.
 - Voters may update their address eleven days before Election Day at 5:00 p.m. by calling 435-843-2140. <u>The post office does not forward ballots</u>.
 - Ballots may be returned to any of the drive-up ballot drop boxes (open 24/7) up through 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. You may drop your ballot at a drop box in Grantsville or Stansbury even if you live in Tooele City. In Tooele City, ballot boxes are located at Tooele City Hall, 90 N. Main St., Tooele (south side of building) or at the Tooele County Bldg, 47 S. Main St., Tooele (rear of building).
- In Person:
- On election day, November 2nd, at Deseret Peak (2930 UT-112, Grantsville, UT) or the Tooele County Building (47 S. Main St., Tooele).

ATTENTION ALL TOOELE CITY COMMERCIAL BUSINESSES

Tooele City is gradually switching to an online payment software for business license payments. All commercial businesses can go to https://www.municipalonlinepayments.com/tooeleut

to enter their information prior to renewals being sent out on December 1, 2021, for the 2022 calendar year. Please include your business license number that is on your business license certificate in the upper left-hand corner under the Tooele City logo. You will then be able to pay your renewal AFTER December 1, 2021. NOTE: If you already have a Tooele City utility account, this is the same website under BUSINESS LICENSES.

BUSINESS LICENSES REQUIRED in Tooele City:

Anyone offering a "Service" from their home, for compensation, requires a Tooele City Business License. Please call the Tooele City Business License Specialist at (435) 843-2110 for more information or go to <u>www.tooelecity.org</u> choose DEPARTMENTS from the menu, and then BUSINESS LICENSING for businesses within Tooele City limits.

DOOR-TO-DOOR SOLICITORS:

ALL door-to-door solicitors (Itinerant/Transient Merchants) must be licensed with Tooele City and must have a 2021 PINK Tooele City ID Badge on and in plain sight. If a solicitor is not wearing a badge call PLEASE CALL Dispatch at (435) 882-5600. Please be sure to give Dispatch a complete description of the individual & the direction they are headed. Thank you!
