MAYOR'S MESSAGE MAYOR DEBBIE WINN


I recently attended the Tooele City Fire Department Annual Banquet to recognize and thank our firefighters for their dedication to serve our residents. During the event, I read the story of the tragic loss of two of our own residents in 1975 during a wildland fire near Stockton. Many people in the city have never heard this story. I believe that it is time for us to construct a permanent memorial that will tell the story and remind our residents of the sacrifice that Mr. Dow and Mr. James made in their efforts to protect life and property. We are in the process of working with members of the Dow and James families to design a memorial that will be placed at the Dow James

Park near the building. We have set up an account here at City Hall to accept donations to make this memorial a reality. You may donate by calling Tooele City Finance Department at 435-843-2150; come to City Hall in person at 90 North Main Street, Tooele; or mail a check to Tooele City Corporation, PO Box 89, Tooele, UT 84074 (please indicate on the check that the payment is for the Dow James Memorial). We will share the full story and a rendering of the memorial in next month's newsletter. I am deeply grateful for the service of our dedicated volunteer Fire Department members. May this memorial also serve as a reminder of the service that they provide on a daily basis.

Thank you to all who attended our first Monday with the Mayor event in person at City Hall or via Facebook Live. We had a great presentation and discussion on speeding and graffiti issues in our city. Several of our residents had great ideas and questions. On Page 3 of this newsletter you can read an email we received from one of our residents on their perspective after participating in our first meeting. Your participation is greatly appreciated! I wish to thank our Tooele City Police Department and their increased effort to address both of these problems. Why participate in Monday with the Mayor?

The following is an excerpt taken from an email we received from a resident who attended our first Monday with the Mayor meeting. It is an excellent summary of the meeting, and a great perspective from one resident. We hope after reading this many of you will also want to participate in our Monday with the Mayor meetings and discussions and will find them informative and beneficial. Monday with the Mayor is held on the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall or you can participate on Facebook Live.

"I attended in person and want to thank you for offering monthly meetings with the Mayor. I like that the topics are limited to a few subjects which allows time for in-depth presentations and discussion. Also, I appreciate the opportunity to shake hands and meet with Mayor Winn, Chief Day, City Council Maresa Manzione, and City Council Ed Hansen.

GRAFFITI:

My eyes were opened to how difficult it is to identify the perpetrators, prove their guilt, and how minimal the consequences are. You could say I have a change of heart as to how much time our police should dedicate to this issue. Our police are short-staffed and budgets are tight. I believe our police have more pressing issues. Thank you to our police department for their hard work in keeping the peace.

Graffiti Takeaways:

1. Invest in higher resolution security cameras at my home. Without solid proof of a crime, it's nearly impossible to hold a person accountable.

2. I support dedicated graffiti walls. Maybe even post their work on social media and possibly in the Transcript-Bulletin to recognize their skills and to encourage them to display their craft in legal venues. It's possible that not all graffiti is a complete disregard for property, but could be one's need to create public art. I agree with Chief Day in that public art should not contain, what is widely regarded as, offending words or graphics.

SPEEDING:

We all do it at some point, (hahaha there are some seniors or a select few who maybe don't). I believe our world has changed and we are expected to accomplish more, in less time, and with many distractions. I don't believe, as a general rule, that people choose to leave inadequate time to get to their destinations, but rather allow it to happen with poor choices leading up to their departure time and most likely make this a habit. I'm shocked to learn that my definition of speeding, 5 mph, and sometimes 10 mph over the posted speed limit on long trips, is not in line with others, who are comfortable with an insane speed and apparently have a total disregard for public safety. Again, I don't believe they fully contemplate the disastrous possibilities, but would surely carry lifelong, deep regret when they finally kill someone.

Speeding Takeaways:

1. I'm less likely to speed now that I'm recently retired and have fewer time constraints along with the ability to live more in the here and now. I know my years of commuting to Salt Lake City entailed habits of speeding due to the pressures of rush hour.

2. I'm in favor of a photo cop that issues a letter to the owner of a speeding car. That would scare me enough to focus on maintaining a legal speed limit for the mere fact it would hurt to throw money away should I get caught in person, and know I was observed speeding. I believe that it's human nature to respond or change when we feel pain or fear. I wish we could make better decisions without that, but we typically don't.

3. Speed bumps may provide some positive impact on the issue of speeding, however, I learned in this meeting that they are mainly used on private property and that on city roads there is a potential for lawsuits. Also, they are susceptible to snowplow damage. This I've seen happen when I've done volunteer, meals on wheels, to trailer courts. So as a citizen of Tooele, I would like us not to risk a lawsuit by having them on our roads. Also, I feel that they are great for private property where the speed limit is maybe 5 or 10 mph. A speed bump on a 25 or more mph road would be aggravating to encounter.

4. I had some thoughts after our speeding discussion. I believe in our working years, many of us lose sight of the reason a particular speed limit is imposed. For example, going faster than the posted 35 mph or 40 mph on our busy Main Street makes it difficult and risky for our neighbors to join in from an East or West adjoining road. Also Highway 36 really doesn't have a "fast" lane as it has exits from both lanes, like leaving Tooele City to turn into Home Depot or coming into Tooele County from the North and needing to exit East to Erda. There was a time when if you pulled out of your driveway, and a car turned a corner to suddenly appear, they would gladly wait for you rather than honk. The scenario is typically no one's fault. We both have a few seconds to be safe and friendly.

Again, thank you. I look forward to future meetings with Mayor Winn, to educate myself on the issues at hand, and do what I can to make this a better place to live, not just for myself, but for all of us."

Mayor Winn, the Tooele City Council, and the residents of Tooele City would like to thank all of our volunteer firefighters for their service to our community!




THANK YOU HAROLD GALLOWAY!



The above schedule is a voluntary outdoor watering guide for Tooele City residents. As you are aware, the Western United States is in a historic drought. Now more than ever water conservation is so important! At this time Tooele City is not implementing mandatory restrictions, but ask our residents to follow the voluntary schedule and take steps on their own to conserve water. We will continue to monitor the situation daily. If our system gets to a point that tank levels are unable to maintain a sustainable rate we will reassess and make decisions at that time.



Find water conservation tips and resources on our website tooelecity.org. There are great resources available to educate residents on how to save water both indoors and outdoors. We will also post tips and resources weekly on our social media sites so follow us on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter.

Tooele City is implementing water conservation and water wise practices. We are switching our parks and facilities to automated irrigation systems with smart controllers. We removed the grass at the Youth Center on 7th Street and are in the process of putting in conservation landscaping that requires less water to maintain. We have taken out some of the unused, decorative grass at the Animal Shelter and will add additional parking. We are trying to do our part, and we ask that you please do yours!

CEMETERY MEMORIAL DAY DECORATIONS



Memorial Day decorations will be allowed to be placed on the grass outside of the concrete border/ lawn mower strip four (4) days prior and six (6) days after Memorial Day. A complete clean-up of the Cemetery will take place beginning the Monday following Memorial Day and allowing one week for

entire clean-up. Flowers in vases will be allowed to remain, all other decorations in the Cemetery will be discarded. Vases and/ or trinkets made of glass, porcelain, or pottery will not be allowed in the cemetery and cannot be glued to monuments or markers. No wire, nails, hangers, steel rods, tent stakes, etc. will be allowed to secure decorations to the ground. Thank you for your help in keeping our cemetery beautiful and clean!

Ideas to Clean Up & Beautify Your Yard

- Sweep sidewalks, curbs, and gutters.
- Mow, pull or spray weeds*.
- Clear away fallen limbs, branches, and leaves.
- Cut back overgrowth (bushes, vines, trees, shrubbery).
- Clear your yard from trash, debris, and clutter.
- Clean up and re-edge flower beds and borders.
- Great time to prep lawns for spring growth (rake, aerate, fertilize, and seed).
- Mow grass and redefine borders of the lawn.
- Neaten up hardscape surfaces (sidewalks, driveways, pathways, patios, porches).
- Clear obstruction (trees, vines, bushes) from sidewalks and roads.
- Patch, replace, or paint worn fences and gates.
- Add a final touch! Plant flowers and plants to add color, beauty and fun to your home!

*Section 8-4 1(a) of Tooele City code states any weeds/grass on real property under 5 acres must be cut and maintained under 6 inches. Property owner is responsible for park strip area(s) adjacent to their lot. Any lot larger than 5 acers must have a border of 30 feet cut and maintained under 6 inches. Violation of this code may result in fines and/or a class B misdemeanor.

Frequently Asked Questions

When does Bulk Waste Pick Up?

Tooele City provides a monthly bulk waste pickup program yearround. The pick up day is once a month (Based on your normal garbage pickup day) for those items which do not fit into your trash container. This service is provided at no additional cost to Tooele City residents and will go a long way in cleaning up our City and keeping it clean. This May you will get an extra bulk waste pick up day. See the schedule below.

Will Bulk Waste pick up old furniture and appliances?

Yes! Bulk Waste accepts old appliances (items must have Freon removed and a label placed indicating removal), mattresses, furniture, carpet, and couches.

Can I put yard waste out for bulk waste pickup?

Yes! Bulk Waste will take your yard waste, such as branches, limbs, and shrubbery but it MUST be bagged, boxed or bundled (with rope or twine), and branches and limbs must be less than 4 inches in diameter and be less than 5 feet in length. Items cannot exceed 75 lbs.

Will Bulk Waste accept hazardous waste?

No! Do not put items such as paint, solvents, batteries, or pesticides out to be picked up by bulk waste. The Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held on Saturday, September 10, 2022. Please visit tooelehealth.org for more information.

2 Bulk Waste Pick Up Days in May for Spring Clean Up

Residential customers: The Bulk Waste Program is offered year round! Take advantage of your extra bulk waste pick up day during May—at no additional cost to you! Please make sure everything is out on your curb before 7:00 a.m. the day of your bulk waste pickup, but not more than 24 hours prior. There is no need to call Tooele City or ACE Disposal to schedule a pickup. If by chance your bulk waste pickup was missed on your pickup day, please call ACE Disposal directly at 435-882-7009. If your items are out of compliance, ACE Disposal will leave a tag on your door indicating the reason they were unable to pick up your items. Some Do's & Don'ts

For this type of pickup it requires to BAG, BUNDLE, or BOX your items. Your boxes, bundles, and bags cannot weigh more than 75 lbs. Bulk waste will not pick up anything that is marked "FREE" or "PLEASE TAKE" or "GIVING AWAY". Bulk waste will not pick up anything that is leaning against fences or mailboxes. Do not park cars or other vehicles in front of your bulk waste or it may not be picked up. We ask you to set out your bulk waste the way <u>you</u> would want to pick it up.
