I wish to express my gratitude for the many hours of dedicated service provided to our residents by our city staff. During the daily checks of our water system on the morning of June 20th, we learned that the fence around water tank #5 had been cut. It was not known at the time if the water had been compromised. In an effort to protect our citizens, and following state law, we notified the State Office of Drinking Water, US Department of Homeland Security, and Tooele County Emergency Management operations. People from all of these organizations, along with many members of our staff, responded to the situation with professionalism and concern for residents. Approximately 24 hours later, the water was proven to be safe and the "do not drink" order was lifted. I am grateful

that the water system was not contaminated, but I am continually frustrated by the lack of disregard by some individuals who seem to have nothing better to do than vandalize our community. After opening the restrooms at all city parks a few weeks ago, many of them were vandalized and had to be closed for repairs less than 24 hours later. I am asking for your help. Please keep an eye out and report anything suspicious. Tooele City offers a \$250 reward for information leading to the arrest of anyone painting graffiti or vandalizing city property. Riding ATV's on city properties is illegal. Please be respectful of others. As we all are affected by the negative aspects of our current world conditions and threats, let's keep our community positive and continue to work together for good!

On a personal note, I wish to extend my deep appreciation to this community for the support, love, and prayers extended to myself and my family before and after the passing of my beautiful granddaughter. May we all continue to be strong, love life, and live like Mak!

I hope you each enjoy wonderful 4th and 24th of July holidays this year.


The City encourages residents not to water during the hottest hours of the day, typically between 10 am and 6 pm. This conserves water and reduces your water bills.

City parks and schools have been placed on a modified schedule because of the size of their lawn areas. While some parks and schools may be watering more than two days each week, each specific area of that park is only watered twice during the week.



NUISANCE WEEDS:

Per Tooele City Code Section 8-4-4 1(a), any weeds/grass on real property under 5 acres must be cut and maintained under

6 inches in height. Property owners are responsible for park strip area(s) adjacent to their lot. Any lot larger than 5 acres must have a border of 30 feet cut and maintained under 6 inches in height. Fines may be assessed for properties not in compliance with City Code.

During the month of May, 135 new Code Enforcement cases were opened and 50 were closed. Thank you Tooele City residents for being a part of keeping our city clean and beautiful.

Dear Tooele City -

During this time of police reform in our nation, I wanted to personally write to all of you to let you know of some of the questions that I have received regarding our department's policies. It deeply troubles me that any member of our community would feel unaccepted or unsafe because of the color of their skin. Please let me assure you that our officers are trained on anti-discrimination and diversity. Our department enjoys an excellent reputation in the community as evidenced by community support when our new building was approved and by the many recent expressions of support we have been receiving. Hopefully the following will be helpful to you:

- 1. What is Tooele City PD's policy on chokeholds/kneeholds? Is there an outright ban? The Tooele City Police Department does not and has not allowed the use of the chokehold for over 20 years. The Department has never approved any type of direct contact with the knee and neck as a restraint method. The Department supports proposed legislation that bans these types of control holds.
- 2. What is your policy on de-escalation? Police Officers are required to attempt de-escalation whenever possible. De-escalation efforts are reviewed in every use of force case in the department. Officers are regularly trained in de-escalation techniques.
- 3. Are police officers required to verbally warn before shooting? Officers should give a verbal warning before shooting. However, it should be understood that some aggression occurs so rapidly that it would be unreasonable to expect someone to give a warning as a condition of saving their own, or another's life.
- 4. How are your officers trained to respond when fellow officers engage in excessive force or other misconduct? Do you have any policies designed to protect whistleblowers? Officers are required, by policy, to intervene and also to report misconduct by fellow officers. Whistleblowers have come forward in the past and have received my personal thanks. Whistleblowers are protected by state and federal law.
- 5. If officers are found guilty of misconduct, how can you ensure other police departments are made aware of this before they are hired elsewhere? State law requires that police chiefs report to the State whenever an officer is guilty of serious misconduct. Our practice has also been to report to the State whenever an officer resigns while under investigation for serious misconduct. All hiring police agencies have access to the status of any officer accused of misconduct through the standard background investigation process.
- 6. Does your department receive implicit bias training? If so, how frequently? Do you screen for pre-existing racist beliefs before hiring? We recently were approved for grant funding that will allow us to train officers on implicit bias. That training curriculum will be required annually for all officers. Each officer is required to undergo a psychological evaluation which screens for bias.
- 7. How does your department handle calls involving someone having an episode of mental illness? Are any of your officers specifically trained for these cases? Do you ever refer those calls to other departments? Officers are trained to handle mental health calls with sensitivity. We have several officers trained as Mental Health Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) responders (see https://cit-utah.com/). We work closely with Valley Behavioral Health and with our local mental health reception facility.
- 8. Do you keep track of demographic data, including race, in your officers' interactions with the public? If so, do you analyze it and seek to find a solution to any inequitable trends that may appear? We did track this data for several years and found no indicators of racial profiling. It is challenging to accurately identify the race of an individual who has been stopped. Many citizens are of mixed race or are not visually identifiable by race. We find it inappropriate to ask persons stopped about their race.

I realize that some people may have the impression that the use of deadly force is a common practice or that all law enforcement agencies are alike. In my forty years as a police officer I have made many arrests and yet I have never used deadly force—for which I am grateful. To my knowledge, no Tooele City Police Officer has ever taken a human life. I am, however, aware of several occasions when Tooele City police officers placed themselves in great danger and chose to not use deadly force. I feel deep gratitude for the men and women of the Tooele City Police Department for their selfless service and for their bravery and restraint. I am also grateful to our community for their outpouring of support during this time and always.
