

- Notice - Recycling Fee Increase

Attention Tooele City Recycling Customers:

Effective October 1, 2023 Tooele City implemented the newly adopted fee for a

recycling can of \$7.18 per month. After a comprehensive external study of the recycling can program, it was been determined this fee increase was necessary in order to continue the service to our residents and to have the recycling program be self-sustainable. This rate was reflected on the bill dated October 26, 2023.

Customers who choose to opt-out of the recycling program may do so by calling 435-843-2150, by emailing a request to <u>utilities@tooelecity.org</u>, or by visiting the Finance Office in person at Tooele City Hall located at 90 N. Main St., Tooele.

SAVETIME... PAY ONLINE!

Tooele City offers several convenient and safe ways to pay your utility bills. Our online utility billing application gives you access to your account 24 hours a day, 365 days

a year and is optimized for mobile devices. It is a convenient way to pay your bills on your own time — with no waiting! By paying your bill online you save postage, plus you have instant account access to view real time balances, payment amounts, bill due dates, and detailed consumption history. You can also submit service requests. AutoPay and Paperless Billing options are available but you must go into your account and set up those options.

Snow Event Parking Restrictions and Winter Weather Reminders



As a reminder, Tooele City code prohibits parking vehicles on the public right-of-way when snow is falling or has accumulated.

Tooele City Code 10-3-6 reads...

"10-3-6. Snow Event Parking Restrictions"

- (1) It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on any public right-of-way:
 - (a) when snow is falling upon that vehicle; or,
 - (b) when snow or ice have accumulated in any amount on the right-of-way upon which that vehicle is parked.
- (2) Any vehicle parked in violation of this Section may be removed at the discretion of the Tooele City Police Department for creating public safety risks and for obstructing the City's snow removal efforts.
- (3) The following are exempt from this Section:
 - (a) emergency vehicles and personnel in the performance of their functions and duties; and,
 - (b) Tooele City public works vehicles and employees in the performance of their functions and duties.

Do not park your vehicles on the street when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated. You may be ticketed.

The civil penalty for parking violations during a snow event is \$50 if paid within 15 days, and \$100 thereafter.

As the winter months approach we want to remind you that residential and business sidewalks must be cleared of snow, hail, ice, and sleet within 24 hours after a storm stops. This is especially important in areas that are school walking routes! Tooele City Code 4-11-15(1) states: "It is unlawful for any person owning or exercising control over any real property abutting any public sidewalk to fail to remove or cause to be removed from such

sidewalk all hail, snow, or sleet falling thereon, or ice forming thereon, within 24 hours after such hail, snow, or sleet has ceased falling or ice has ceased forming."

Do not place or propel snow, hail, ice and sleet in roadway or other portions of sidewalks. Tooele City Code 4-11-15(2) states: "It is unlawful for any person to place or propel, or cause to be placed or propelled, snow, ice, hail, or sleet in the public way or in any manner which poses a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic." Please be courteous to your neighbors, do not blow leaves, snow or other debris into their yards. Thank you!

Please do not park your vehicles on the street (or on the park strip or the sidewalk—they are also the right-of-way) when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated. Streets needs to be clear of vehicles, basketball hoops, and other obstructions for plows to safely and efficiently clear the streets. Trees should be trimmed to at least a 12'6" minimum so they do not obstruct or damage plows. Also, as a reminder, if your basketball hoop is on the park strip, please make sure the hoop itself doesn't hang over the street where it can get snagged on the snow plows.

SEMI-TRUCKS — Per Tooele City Code, semi-trucks, shall not park overnight on city streets other than designated truck routes. In section 10-2-7(3) the following are designated truck routes: "(a) SR-36 (Main Street); (b) SR-112; (c) Tooele Boulevard (1100 W. St.); (d) Droubay Road; (e) Pine Canyon Road; (f) other streets as designated by express written permission of the police chief..."

WHERE ARE YOU DUMPING THAT GREASE?



One of the major causes of sewage backups is animal and vegetable fats that get dumped down sink drains. After a short trip through the sewer line, fats and grease congeal, therefore blocking the passage of household waste. Solidified grease wreaks havoc by causing blockages in

sewer laterals to homes, in the sewer system's main lines, and at the Water Reclamation Facility.

With the holidays approaching and the cooking of turkeys, especially in deep fryers, please do not drain fats down kitchen sinks. Allow any fats to congeal and dispose of them in your trash. Do not dump or pour any grease, fats, or oils into drains or toilets.

Thank you for helping keep our sewer system running smoothly!

HELP US KEEP OUR SEWER SYSTEM RUNNING SMOOTHLY — LEARN WHAT NOT TO FLUSH!

Please DO NOT FLUSH the following:

- Paper towels, disposable wipes—which includes wipes that say they are "flushable", washcloths, or rags
- Synthetic materials such as plastic, which do not decompose or dissolve
- Feminine products
- Cotton balls
- Diapers and baby wipes
- Unused Medications or Syringes
- Hazardous materials or chemicals
- Fats, Oils, and Grease—place food scraps in the garbage

The Drinking Water Source Protection Plan for Tooele City is available for your review. It contains information about source protection zones, potential contamination sources, and management strategies to protect each of our drinking water sources. Potential contamination sources common in our protection areas include sanitary sewer lines, septic tanks, roads, residential, commercial and industrial areas, etc. These sources of potential contamination are typically classified as a low susceptibility. Sources which are classified as medium susceptibility include buried fuel storage tanks, accidental spills of potential contaminants, or other similar conditions. The City has developed management strategies to further protect all of our sources from contamination. Public Works Department Projects and Updates

Project Updates:

- 7th Street Road and Utility Improvement Project between 500 North to 600 North is complete. This project widened 7th Street where it was very narrow between 500 North to 600 North and added a storm drain system from 500 North to Valley View Drive.
- 2023 Roadway and Waterline Projects are complete. We have older waterlines in the City that are 6" lines and the standard is now 8" lines. We continually work to upgrade our 6" lines to 8" lines. In this year's budget, the waterline on Clifford Drive and 1220 South were replaced, and the pressure regulator valve was replaced on Lisa Way. After waterlines were replaced, we did a complete road rebuild of Lisa Way, Clifford Drive, and 1220 South. Many other streets were treated with slurry seal. Slurry seal is a cost effective way to preserve the integrity of and increase the longevity of our roads. Some roads are past the point where slurry seal is effective, and those roads are then considered for mill and overlay or rebuild. We are always looking for cost effective methods for road preservation.
- Water Reclamation Facility—Headworks Building The Headworks building is the first line of treatment for waste water. It removes the grits and screenings from the wastewater before it goes into secondary treatment. This is where all of the stuff that doesn't belong in the sewer, that should go in the garbage, has to be taken out (see 4 for a list of items that should not go in the sewer). Our current building is dilapidated and isn't properly removing the garbage from the waste stream, which in turn, reduces the effectiveness in our secondary treatment. Construction of a new Headworks building and additive alternate sewer main was approved by the City Council in April 2023 for a combined total of \$8.6 Million. Construction began in mid-September. The funding for the project will be derived by a combination of ARPA funds (\$2 Million), general fund revenues, sewer enterprise revenues, and/or sewer impact fees. The new Headworks building and equipment will improve processes and increase the treatment capacity for that portion of the facility. Other areas of the plant will also need to be updated to increase overall capacity at the Water Reclamation Facility as our community continues to grow.

What's Coming Up?


- Our Streets Department is busy crack sealing the roads. We crack seal our roads in the spring and fall. Crack sealing seals the cracks so ice and moisture doesn't get into the cracks and expand, creating pot holes. We crack seal in the fall to help prepare our roads for snow. The Streets Department is also busy trimming park strip trees in several areas around the City. We encourage residents to trim their own park strip trees to allow larger vehicles like snowplows to get closer to the curb without the trees causing damage to the vehicles. The Streets Department has been installing stop signs at many locations throughout the City, including on 270 South. These stops signs were installed at the request of residents in the neighborhood who were concerned about safety as many vehicles were not slowing, yielding, or using caution when approaching the unsigned intersections.
- As we head into the fall season, the Water Department is working on getting well houses winterized. They are cleaning up well house sites and getting them ready for the winter.



- The sewer collection crews are continually cleaning sewer main lines.
 This helps prevent clogs in the main system. As we cannot give advanced notice of cleaning activities, best practice is to always keep your toilet lid closed, as occasionally the pressure from cleaning main lines can cause toilets to burp (causing water to splash in your toilet).
 The water that splashes is only the water in your toilet bowl, not sewer backup.
- The Fleet Maintenance crews is prepping for winter, making sure snowplow trucks are running and putting salters on the trucks.

ENGLAND ACRES PARK is near completion. We are waiting on the final gates for the dog park. Once the gates are installed the dog park will be open. We remind residents to bring your own bags and clean up after your pet(s). All dogs should be licensed and vaccinated.

ENGLAND ACRES TRAIL is anticipated to be paved by the end of the year. Because of supply chain issues, the trail lighting will be installed next Spring and not when the trail opens.

DON'T FEED THE WILD ANIMALS!

• If you feed wild animals it causes them to congregate in your neighborhood.

 If you congregate wildlife, such as turkey and deer, it significantly increases the chances for disease transmission. It is better for their health if you don't congregate/ feed them.

- If you feed wild animals and bring them closer to town, it causes issues and creates a situation where DWR must relocate them.
- Congregating turkey and deer brings in their predators.
- There is plenty of food outside of City limits that animals can feed on. The animals will not go hungry even if you don't feed them. Biologists are continually watching for the welfare of the animals.
- There are many online resources available to help you learn how to detract deer from your yard. Learn what vegetation you can plant that deer do not prefer and learn how to "Landscape for Wildlife".
- One suggestion is to put deer fencing up around your garden and the vegetation that the deer love to eat.
- For more information contact DWR at 801-491-5678.
- If you see wildlife that has been hit and is on the road, please contact dispatch at 435-882-5600, or DWR, to report the address where the animal is laying and DWR will come and pick up the animal.
