

# **MAYOR'S MESSAGE**

# **MAYOR DEBBIE WINN**

As Mayor, I have the privilege of serving a community that values progress, care, and well-being. That's why I want to talk about something deeply important to all of us—safety on our roads. Whether we drive, ride a bike, or walk, each trip carries risks, which is why I want to highlight **UDOT's Zero Fatalities Program**.

I had the opportunity to participate in a UDOT Zero Fatalities Workshop in October, along with many other community leaders and field experts from around our County and UDOT. The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) launched the Zero Fatalities Program with one simple but ambitious goal: to eliminate deaths on our roads.

Every year, hundreds of lives are tragically lost due to preventable traffic accidents, and each of these fatalities affects a family, a community, and all of us. The Zero Fatalities initiative focuses on five deadly behaviors that contribute to most road accidents: **distracted driving, drowsy driving, aggressive driving, impaired driving, and not buckling up.** While these might seem like commonsense issues, it's clear that we still have work to do when it comes to changing our culture around road safety. That's where all of us come in.

Some people follow traffic laws out of fear of being fined. While enforcement is an important tool for safety, I believe it's time for us to adopt a mindset shift—from worrying about penalties to prioritizing the well-being of ourselves and others. We need to move from thinking, "I didn't run the stop sign because I didn't want a ticket," to "I didn't run the stop sign because I want to keep my family, friends, and neighbors safe." This cultural shift is at the heart of the Zero Fatalities program. Every time you make the conscious decision to follow traffic laws, you are participating in something much bigger than avoiding a fine. You are actively contributing to the safety of our entire community.

UDOT offers a wealth of resources to help all of us improve our driving habits. Here are a few you can explore today:

- Educational Workshops and Seminars: UDOT frequently hosts events that address the five deadly driving behaviors. These workshops are great for new drivers and seasoned drivers alike to refresh their understanding of road safety.
- Online Tools and Tips: Visit <u>zerofatalities.com</u> for tips on safe driving practices, interactive tools, and real-life stories from families affected by traffic accidents.
- 3. **Community Engagement Programs**: There are opportunities to partner with schools, businesses, and community organizations to spread awareness about safe driving.
- 4. **Distracted Driving Simulators**: UDOT provides access to simulators that help drivers understand the dangers of distracted driving. Encourage your teenagers or employees to give it a try—it's a powerful, eye-opening experience.

5. **Family and Workplace Pledges**: Take the Zero Fatalities pledge as a family or business. By committing to safer habits, you'll set an example for others and create a ripple effect that makes our roads safer.

As a City, we thrive when we work together. Here's how you can contribute to building a culture of safety:

- **Be a role model**: Whether you're driving or walking, always practice safe behaviors. Follow speed limits, avoid distractions, and stay mindful of others on the road.
- Talk to your family: Road safety starts at home. Have conversations with your kids, friends, and neighbors about why these behaviors matter.
- **Get involved**: Participate in UDOT's community safety programs or volunteer to help promote road safety awareness in your neighborhood.

I want to thank each and every one of you for your efforts to keep our streets safe. I am confident that if we come together and embrace a culture of safety-first, we will see fewer tragedies on our roads. By putting safety before convenience, we can help achieve our common goal of zero fatalities. Let's drive change—together.

# THE COUNCIL'S CORNER

It's that wonderful time of year when we begin to think about the things we are grateful for, and our thoughts turn to helping our neighbors. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve my community; I am grateful for the many others who serve and help make our community a better place to live.

Fall is also the time of year that our property tax bills are due. Property tax is one form of income that is part of a city's budget. To give a very simple explanation to a complicated topic, the amount of property tax collected by a city each year doesn't change (apart from growth). The amount a taxpayer pays, fluctuates based on the valuation of their property (the valuation is determined based on a formula used by the County). Residential property owners receive a 45% discount on the value of their property. Business properties, rental properties, and second homes do not receive this discount.

Tooele City is focused on economic development. Economic development is very important to the City because it increases the overall valuation of property within the City and County, thus decreasing the overall tax burden on homeowners. There are several other reasons that economic development benefits a city — to bring new sales tax to the city and retain sales tax that is being paid outside Tooele, to create new jobs for residents, to retain workforce that may be commuting elsewhere, and to create options for our residents either in the workforce or shopping. Better infrastructure also comes with new development.

In 2019, commercial property in Tooele City was valued at over \$451 million. As of January 2024, that valuation has increased to over \$1 billion. These 2024 values do not include the two new hotels being built in Tooele, the several manufacturing businesses being built at the Tooele Business Park and Peterson Industrial Depot, the 1000 North and Main project, and the Compass Point Business Development in northwest Tooele. Much of the increase in property value is due to the efforts of Tooele City and the focus of the City Council, Mayor, and Administration to recruit business to Tooele.

We welcome these many new businesses to Tooele City for the great addition to our tax base, retention of sales tax dollars in the City, new jobs and less commuting out of the City, and new shopping opportunities.

# - Notice Street Light and Storm Drain Fee Increase

# **Attention Tooele City Customers:**

After a comprehensive external study of the street light and storm water systems, it has been determined that a fee increase is necessary in order to properly maintain and provide additional infrastructure for these systems. Effective January 1, 2025, Tooele City will implement the newly adopted fees for street light and storm water fees. Please see the graph below. The new rates will be reflected on the bill dated January 26, 2025.

# **Snow Event Parking Restrictions and Winter Weather Reminders**



As a reminder, Tooele City code prohibits parking vehicles on the public right-of-way when snow is falling or has accumulated.

Tooele City Code 10-3-6 reads...

#### "10-3-6. Snow Event Parking Restrictions"

- (1) It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on any public right-of-way:
  - (a) when snow is falling upon that vehicle; or,
  - (b) when snow or ice have accumulated in any amount on the right-of-way upon which that vehicle is parked.
- (2) Any vehicle parked in violation of this Section may be removed at the discretion of the Tooele City Police Department for creating public safety risks and for obstructing the City's snow removal efforts.
- (3) The following are exempt from this Section:
  - (a) emergency vehicles and personnel in the performance of their functions and duties; and,
  - (b) Tooele City public works vehicles and employees in the performance of their functions and duties.

Please do not park your vehicles on the street when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated. You may be ticketed.

The civil penalty for parking violations during a snow event is \$50 if paid within 15 days, and \$100 thereafter.

As the winter months approach, we want to remind you that residential and business sidewalks must be cleared of snow, hail, ice, and sleet within 24 hours after a storm stops. This is especially important in areas that are school walking routes! Tooele City Code 4-11-15(1) states: "It is unlawful for any person owning or exercising control over any real property abutting any public sidewalk to fail to remove or cause to be removed from such

sidewalk all hail, snow, or sleet falling thereon, or ice forming thereon, within 24 hours after such hail, snow, or sleet has ceased falling or ice has formed."

Do not place or propel snow, hail, ice and sleet in roadway or other portions of sidewalks. Tooele City Code 4-11-15(2) states: "It is unlawful for any person to place or propel, or cause to be placed or propelled, snow, ice, hail, or sleet in the public way or in any manner which poses a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic." Please also be courteous to your neighbors, do not blow leaves, snow, or other debris into their yards. Thank you!

Please do not park your vehicles on the street (or on the park strip or the sidewalk—they are also the right-of-way) when snow is falling or when snow or ice have accumulated. Streets needs to be clear of vehicles, basketball hoops, and other obstructions for plows to safely and efficiently clear the streets. Trees should be trimmed to at least a 12'6" minimum so they do not obstruct or damage plows. Also, as a reminder, if your basketball hoop is on the park strip, please make sure the hoop itself doesn't hang over the street where it can get snagged on the snow plows.

**SEMI-TRUCKS** — Per Tooele City Code, semi-trucks, shall not park overnight on city streets other than designated truck routes. In section 10-2-7(3) the following are designated truck routes: "(a) SR-36 (Main Street); (b) SR-112; (c) Tooele Boulevard (1100 W. St.); (d) Droubay Road; (e) Pine Canyon Road; (f) other streets as designated by express written permission of the police chief..."

#### WHERE ARE YOU DUMPING THAT GREASE?



One of the major causes of sewage backups is animal and vegetable fats that get dumped down sink drains. After a short trip through the sewer line, fats and grease congeal, therefore blocking the passage of household waste. Solidified grease wreaks havoc by causing blockages in

sewer laterals to homes, in the sewer system's main lines, and at the Water Reclamation Facility.

With the holidays approaching and the cooking of turkeys, especially in deep fryers, please do not drain fats down kitchen sinks. Allow any fats to congeal and dispose of them in your trash. Do not dump or pour any grease, fats, or oils into drains or toilets.

Thank you for helping keep our sewer system running smoothly!

# HELP US KEEP OUR SEWER SYSTEM RUNNING SMOOTHLY — LEARN WHAT NOT TO FLUSH!

Please DO NOT FLUSH the following:

- Paper towels, disposable wipes—which includes wipes that say they are "flushable", washcloths, or rags
- Synthetic materials such as plastic, which do not decompose or dissolve
- Feminine products
- Cotton balls
- Diapers and baby wipes
- Unused Medications or Syringes
- Hazardous materials or chemicals
- Fats, Oils, and Grease—place food scraps in the garbage

The Drinking Water Source Protection Plan for Tooele City is available for your review. It contains information about source protection zones, potential contamination sources, and management strategies to protect each of our drinking water sources. Potential contamination sources common in our protection areas include sanitary sewer lines, septic tanks, roads, residential, commercial and industrial areas, etc. These sources of potential contamination are typically classified as a low susceptibility. Sources which are classified as medium susceptibility include buried fuel storage tanks, accidental spills of potential contaminants, or other similar conditions. The City has developed management strategies to further protect all of our sources from contamination. # **TOOELE CITY PROJECTS UPDATE**

Infrastructure projects continue in Tooele City this fall. If you have questions about these projects, please call the Tooele City Public Works Department at 435-843-2130. We appreciate your cooperation and patience during this important work!

#### **Project Updates:**

- ⇒ 200 West Road Widening: Utility relocation is scheduled, and plans are underway for the proposed widening on 200 West between 500 North to 600 North.
- ⇒ 520 East 1000 North Traffic Signal: A traffic signal has been warranted and has been approved for construction at this intersection. We anticipate the signal will be installed within the next 6 to 12 months.
- ⇒ <u>Berra Boulevard and 2000 North Roundabout</u>: New striping and signage is complete at the roundabout and on 2000 North.
- ⇒ <u>Cemetery Roads</u>: Several roads in the cemetery were repaired with new asphalt. Gillette Lane, Delamare Lane, Swan Drive, and Atkin Way have all been repaired.
- ⇒ <u>Droubay Road Widening Project</u>: Construction continues on this project, which includes road widening, curb, gutter, sidewalk, lighting, and a walking/biking path on Droubay Road between Vine Street and Smelter Road. Asphalt should be laid and Droubay Road should be open in November while other work on the project continues.
- ⇒ Roadwork Projects: Two cul-de-sacs were roto-milled and asphalted this fall. Chip seal work was completed on 7th Street, 600 North (east of Main Street), 700 North (east of Main Street), Deer Hollow Road, Elk Meadow, and Oakridge Drive.

#### What's Coming Up?

- The Streets Department is busy crack sealing roads to prevent ice and moisture from getting into the cracks and expanding, creating potholes. This is done in the spring and then again in the fall to prepare roads for winter. The Streets Department will also be busy trimming park strip trees in several areas around the City. We encourage residents to trim their own park strip trees to allow larger vehicles like snowplows to get closer to the curb without the trees causing damage to the vehicles.
- As we head into the fall season, the Water Department is working on getting well houses winterized. They are cleaning up well house sites and getting them ready for the winter.




- The sewer collection crews are continually cleaning sewer main lines. This helps prevent clogs in the main system. As we cannot give advanced notice of cleaning activities, best practice is to always keep your toilet lid closed, as occasionally the pressure from cleaning main lines can cause toilets to burp (causing water to splash in your toilet). The water that splashes is only the water in your toilet bowl, not sewer backup.
- The Fleet Maintenance crew is prepping for winter, making sure snowplow trucks are running and putting salters on the trucks.



# DON'T FEED THE WILD ANIMALS!

- If you feed wild animals it causes them to congregate in your neighborhood.
- If you congregate wildlife, such as turkey and deer, it significantly increases the chances for disease

transmission. It is better for their health if you don't congregate/ feed them.

- If you feed wild animals and bring them closer to town, it causes issues and creates a situation where DWR must relocate them.
- Congregating turkey and deer brings in their predators.
- There is plenty of food outside of City limits that animals can feed on. The animals will not go hungry even if you don't feed them. Biologists are continually watching for the welfare of the animals.
- There are many online resources available to help you learn how to detract deer from your yard. Learn what vegetation you can plant that deer do not prefer and learn how to "Landscape for Wildlife".
- One suggestion is to put deer fencing up around your garden and the vegetation that the deer love to eat.
